Here are some general questions to check for comprehension.

<u>Fiction</u>

Who are the main characters? What is the setting of the story? What happened in the beginning, middle, and end?

If you could change the ending of the story, what would you change and why?

Why do you think the author chose the title he/she did? Is it a good title?

Which character are you most like? Most unlike?

Nonfiction

What are some things that you didn't know before reading this book?

Look at the text features (headings, captions, charts/graphs). How did they help you understand what you read?

What kind of pictures or illustrations would have made the text better?

Do you have any questions that the author didn't answer about the topic?
